Fantastic fencing from Walmley Ash!

"Walmley Ash Allotment plot holders were hit by a series of shed raids and petty thefts at the beginning of 2018, so they decided to look at improving the security of the site.

The committee decided to apply for a grant from the Big National Lottery Fund and were successful in being given £10,000.

With this money and also a generous grant from the Birmingham Council they were able to replace the 60-year-old fencing, which was overgrown and collapsing along its length, with a new two-metre-high palisade fence stretching over 100 metres bordering the railway embankment.

The new fence is a real deterrent and makes the plots safer and the site more attractive.

Half Yearly Meeting

Thank you for all those who were able to spare the time to attend the meeting at Bordesley Green. It was a good meeting and well attended. Councillor Sharon Thompson was due to attend, but sends her apologies. When travelling to the site she wasn't able to locate the entrance despite asking local residents. Unfortunately, a lot of our sites, including Bordesley Green, are hidden away off the main road, whilst this might make us more private, it also can make us invisible, creating a challenge for Associations trying to publicise plots and encourage new plot holders.

We discussed the problems that Associations have been having with Water Plus. You will all have realised that they are charging us for full return to sewers despite most of our water being used for irrigation. This is very unfair. On contacting water Plus recently, I was informed that the following address is a direct contact to the department whose role is to deal with such enquiries-keyaccountmanagement@water-plus.co.uk hopefully by the time you read this newsletter I will have received a response from my enquiry, please feel free use this address yourselves. Nikki is hopeful that at long last there maybe some movement towards solving this issue but please continue to put some pressure on Water Plus.

We also discussed the frustratingly slow progress of getting site maintenance through the Flo Pickering Fund. Landscape Practice Group, the Council department responsible for managing the works, was given a list of the most urgent jobs early in the year. Recently they stated that work will start on the first site in March 2019, this means that it is taking twelve months to process just one request. This is unacceptable. Work is urgently needed on many allotment sites across the city. Nikki is working hard with her managers to find solutions enabling the process to speed up, hopefully this will improve next year. We will keep you posted.

ALLOTMENT HISTORY

Read this account from 1918 sent in by Stuart Guest, Tennal Lane Allotments.

The following is from an article in the Birmingham Mail, Thursday August 1st 1918.

"A boy of thirteen was charged at Birmingham's Children's Court to-day with wilfully damaging crops on an allotment in Tennal Road, belonging to Mr John Lennox Fleetwood, Wentworth Road, Harborne.

Chief inspector Chadwick met the boy in Tennal road about 8.30 on the evening of July 22 carrying a bag containing freshly picked broad beans, carrots and potatoes, and the police officer arrested him.

The boy who had been in trouble before, was sent to a reformatory school for five years."
