We have already seen a few new improvements to the site. You may have noticed the road has had some repairs. Thanks to Frank Mulraney for organising and helping on the day of the tarmac repairs. This only cost us £100 which is very good considering the materials alone could have cost us twice that.

Ron has fixed a troublesome tap near the tip end of the site and he and I also replaced the flimsy polythene of the gate notcieboard with some rigid perspex. Furthermore, some hedgeline trees have received a new woodchip mulch and Wendy has been watering them through dry spells. Barbed wire has been erected on the fence beside the main gate.

We shall hopefully be receiving another gift of trees from the Woodland Trust next February to augment our own homegrown trees. These are destined for the hedgeline inside our perimeter fence to boost our security. Plotters are reminded that this hedgeline is not part of their plots and belongs to the entire site as per the council's rules, so if you've planted anything there you have until November to remove and replant on your plot.

If you wish to take part in the planting of the trees you can! There will be work parties from November onwards to prepare the area and plant the prickly hawthorns, the pretty cherries and the tasty hazels (should the wildlife allow us some nuts).

The committee are working towards obtaining a grant from the National Lottery. We have many ideas of how to spend it but if you have more please let us know.

Wildlife. We have a resident hedgehog so please be sparing with your non-organic slug pellets. Monty Don says you only need throw on about half a dozen a time, no need to carpet your brassica patch with them.

We are to erect a kestrel box in the hope our friend the kestrel nests here and sees to our

vermin problem. Six out of the eight nestboxes put up around the site last year were nested in.

Place your nestboxes in a quiet corner of your plot and don't disturb them. If you have a birdfeeder on your plot make sure it's full this winter. Also, remember to clean it with a mild bleach solution otherwise you'll just spread diseases.
